Dear Friends

I wonder how many of you have had that experience of going upstairs to fetch something and on reaching the top, finding that you have forgotten what it was that you went for. Only when you go down again, are you able to remember what it was that you wanted. Being back where you first thought of the thing that you wanted acts as a kind of cue or trigger for the memory.

And memory is an important part of our identity. If we don't know where we've come from we don't really know who we are, something that is clearly demonstrated by the desire that many adopted children have to trace their natural parents. And the importance of memory to identity is as true of nations as it is of individuals.

Early in the book that bears his name, the Old Testament hero, Joshua, is told by God that after the Israelites have crossed the river Jordan, dry-foot, into the Promised Land, they are to erect twelve stones taken from the middle of the river in the place where they camp that first night in their new country. The reason for this, Joshua tells the people, is that they are to be a memorial to the people of Israel for ever, marking the place where the waters of the Jordan were cut off before the ark of the covenant of the Lord and helping them remember what God had done for them.

November is the month for remembering, beginning with the memorial services around All Souls' Day, when, as individuals, we have the opportunity to remember before God those who have had, perhaps, the most formative influence on our lives and whose presence we miss the most.

Then comes the national act of remembering those who have died in the service of our country, especially in the two great wars that have had such a defining influence on the character of the British. The importance of Remembrance Sunday is well made by George Santayana who, in his book "Reason in Common Sense," said, "Those who cannot remember the past, are condemned to repeat it," later paraphrased by Winston Churchill as, "Those who fail to learn from history are condemned to repeat it." Remembrance Sunday has many lessons to teach us!

However, for Christians the greatest act of remembrance is the one that is enacted Sunday by Sunday during Holy Communion, when we follow Jesus' request at the Last Supper to "do this in remembrance of me," and, in receiving the bread and the wine that represent his body and his life blood offered up on the cross, recognise just what was the cost to Jesus of our salvation.

At the May joint meeting of the Men's & Women's Group, we considered how walking together can be a good way of meeting with others and enriching our fellowship. So a group of nine people (and two very well behaved dogs!) walked 3½ miles along the Thames Path from London Bridge to Canary Wharf. This was very enjoyable (especially lunch at The Captain Kidd Pub) and we decided to organise another ramble.

So, on Saturday 7 September another group of nine people walked into 'Green Croydon'. The route took us from St Francis' Church along the 'London Loop' through Spring Park and Shirley Heath to Addington Hills and Heathfield Gardens. We paused for a packed lunch here, where we gathered around convenient seats and a bistro table next to the colourful herbaceous border. The Curtain Falls On The Work Club

Sadly, the Churches Together in West Wickham Work Club has ceased operating on Mondays in West Wickham Library. Since the launch in May 2013, the volunteer coaches provided over 150 clients with advice on CV development and revision; assisted with job searching and helped clients prepare for interviews. The vast majority of these job seekers were signposted to the club from the Bromley Job Centre Plus. However, in the last year, the footfall at the Job Centre has fallen dramatically. So, the employment advisers at the Centre are offering the same services as the Work Club coaches. Consequently, the number of clients visiting the Work Club in the Library since last January has dwindled to a trickle. The decision has therefore been taken to cease operating. If there is an increase in unemployment again, we may well resurrect the club as the expertise is too valuable to lose.

The club was launched six years ago, very much on a wing and a prayer as we had no idea of the extent of unemployment in West Wickham. The club has been blessed with several dedicated volunteer coaches who have shown gifts of empathy, computer skills and, often, the patience of Job! Thank you to all of them, for without the coaches, the club would not have been the success that it was. Thanks also are due to Churches Together in West Wickham, who supported the club by prayer and also with finance. The email account for the club is still open and monitored, so if anyone needs advice they can email ctwwworkclub@gmail.com and their query will be answered.

Bishop Richard writes

So many issues in life focus around our sense of identity, meaning. There is growing awareness of the huge and damaging impact of human activity on both our climate and biodiversity across planet Earth. The effects of this are becoming more and more obvious in our own country and dramatically more so in other parts of the world. There have been some encouraging responses to this, such as the Paris agreement in 2015 and the recent UK government commitment to be carbon neutral by 2050. There are many arguments about the best approaches to achieve effective action. Some are very supportive of the approach of Extinction Rebellion whilst others see it as a step too far. Some argue that we should divest immediately from fossil fuels, others that we should stay invested in the large energy companies and influence policy from within. In the UK at the moment this also takes place in the midst of our political chaos in dealing with the issue of Brexit with all the underlying questions about the identity, values and direction of our country in the 21st-century. The pressing issues around Brexit, important as they are, can mean that even bigger challenges which face us can fade into the background.

We are in urgent need of the values which help us navigate these complex policy and lifestyle issues in a way that leads genuinely to the common good of all God's creation. For Christians our response to this is not simply a moral one, but it springs out of our whole understanding of how we see our place in the universe – our relatedness to God, the world, each other, and all of God's creation. It is central to the primary themes of the Gospel – creation, redemption, salvation, and the resurrection order. As such, it needs to be properly expressed in worship, which both expresses our Christian faith and shapes

our hearts and minds and the way we live. And it needs to be lived out in our daily lives and actions. Looking at the central elements of the Gospel through the lens of the environment and all God's creation can deepen and enlarge our understanding of the good news of God's love in Christ.

In church life there have been some important developments such as the establishment of a Church of England national environment working group, on which I and others from our Diocese sit, and the crucial Eco-Church and Eco-Diocese programme run by A Rocha. Liturgically some very good material has been produced especially for the Creationtide season, which runs from 1 September - 4 October, embracing themes from Franciscan spirituality and the harvest festival season. This is a good start, but it needs to go far deeper.

In our own Diocese there have been many excellent initiatives (supported by our Diocesan Environment Officer and Working Group, and by the Board of Education) in both parishes and schools with a growing number signing up to the Eco-Church process. If parishes are not already signed up Creationtide is a good time to ask why not? Importantly, the Diocesan Synod at its meeting in July has supported unanimously the move to registering as an Eco-Diocese. This excellent initiative provides a strong and deeply Christian framework for engaging with all the challenges that the environment crisis raises. In the next few crucial years it will help us to think through at every level of our institutional life what our Christian response should be. As with the Eco-Church framework this will mean reflecting on our deep theology of creation and salvation, expressing this in our worship and prayer, and living it out in our daily actions. I hope and pray we will all engage with this process as fully as we can.





